A night of culinary celebration in the city

More than 1000 people turned out last week to sample delicacies at 25 restaurants around Norwich. Property editor **Caroline Culot** was lucky to be one of them and reports on the annual event sponsored by Cozens-Hardy solicitors.

It's a Tuesday evening and Norwich city centre is buzzing as 1,147 diners move noisily and happily from restaurant to restaurant as part of the much-loved annual event that is Lloyd Addison's Moveable Feast.

A lasting legacy founded by former councillor and restaurateur Lloyd Addison 17 years ago, the Moveable Feast has raised over £85,000 for Parkinson's UK since his death in 2008. For the past six years, Norwich-based solicitors Cozens-Hardy LLP have sponsored the event.

The concept is simple – three courses, each eaten in a different city centre restaurant, with the venues being chosen for you. The logistics of the event, however, are far from simple. Lloyd's widow, Cynthia, personally deals with all the restaurants and handles the ticket bookings - until very recently she even allocated the restaurants by hand. Supported by her daughter Lauren and a tiny organising committee, Cynthia is joined on the evening by more than 70 local volunteers for Parkinson's UK.

This - and the tremendous support of the selected restaurants - is what makes the event so special, and is what ensures that it sells out months in advance every single year. Lloyd lived with Parkinson's for nearly 20 years and his passion for supporting our city's culinary heritage and Parkinson's UK is embodied in the Moveable Feast. While, as an event, it's grown beyond anyone's imagination, it remains true to its founding principles of raising much-needed funds for charity as well as the profile of the local restaurant scene in Norwich.

Cozens-Hardy solicitors are well established within the local food and drink industry and, as partner Philippa Rudd explains, the decision to sponsor the Moveable Feast six years ago was an easy one:
